- We are a not-for-profit organisation, owned by our member local councils more than 250 across the whole of the UK
- Our USP is frontline services
- We campaign for excellence in frontline services and we believe in the value of directly provided frontline services
- Alongside frontline service networks we have one of the largest research programmes in local government and operate the UK's largest voluntary data-benchmarking service

Stewards of Place

- Neighbourhood services a term we tested with our member councils – encompasses refuse, recycling, parks, leisure, street-scene, highways and many more services
- The most visible services 'on the doorstep' to our communities
- Budget pressures have not been equal money has been used to support adult and children's services, homelessness and other priorities
- Neighbourhood services have taken the Lion's share of cuts in some cases well above 50% - for well over a decade



Why?


- The public want councils to get more money for local services
- Satisfaction with frontline services remains high- but that is a testimony to the efforts put in by councils to keep the 'show on the road'.
- The findings of our APSE Survation Survey demonstrates this

Public feel that local services are declining






Is enough of your taxes spent in your area?






The public want councils to get more funding

Trust in 'you' as local councils is high!

- 1. Public trust in Local Councils marginally lower than last year, remains significantly above other institutions such as national government and private companies.
- 2. They trust you <u>much</u> more to spend their <u>taxes</u> than national government.
- 3. Satisfaction levels with services are broadly similar to 2022, School Meals and Road maintenance, however, have seen a notable decrease.



But is trust enough to fix the problem?

- We need more resources that is obvious!
- In the absence of resources, we have to do more with our local communities so that they understand the challenges
- In Luton my own council we are aware that communities can feel left behind
- It is important to work across partners.

Some Luton Council examples of working across partners and securing new ways to engage with residents

LBC, Bedfordshire Police worked with the Community in securing Britian First being banned in Luton's Mosques and then all Mosques in England and Wales;

- Luton is an incredibly diverse and vibrant town
- We could not tolerate any individual seeking to cause disharmony or provoke tensions within our communities
- Everyone of course has the right to peaceful protest
- This was not about banning demonstrations but exercising our duty to protect our community from unnecessary tensions and disharmony



Some Luton Council examples of working with culture and arts

Luton Investment Framework (Now our 2040 Vision) incorporating Culture and Luton working with Arts Council's England to embed culture within Luton

- Culture and the arts is increasingly important especially if facilities or assets have been lost or closed in local areas
- Our investment is centred around arts and cultures and is part of the corporate vision the 2040 vision for Luton
- We have increased the number of Non-Profit Organisations
- We used our strategy to secure the BBC Radio 1 'Big Weekend' from 24 May to 26 May 2024. You can come along!

Some Luton Council examples of fairness in action and embracing our diversity

One of the first councils to pass a Black Lives Matter Motion

- Luton councillors quickly realised that our communities wanted us to show leadership as tensions around the world increased – reflected by the rapid growth in the Black Lives Matters movement
- Luton passed a motion in support of the campaign
- This led directly to the development of our Fairness Taskforce
- The work was recognised nationally with Luton shortlisted for the MJ awards in 2022.



Making sustainability a reality: the 3 level shift



the economy should be driving sustainability

the objective of the economy: "allocating the resources available to society in a way that maximizes social wellbeing" (Goodland and Ledec, 1987)

wellbeing: positive state of being where current and future needs are met, such that there is the capacity and opportunity to flourish (BS 8950:2020, 3.7, adapted)

the objective of sustainable development: "development that meets the needs (*wellbeing*) of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs" (WCED 1987)

THE SHARED OBJECTIVE: LONG-TERM WELLBEING FOR ALL (SUSTAINABILITY)

the economy should be driving sustainability

Local Government Act 2000 – purpose of Local Authorities:

2 Promotion of well-being

- (1) Every local authority are to have power to do anything which they consider is likely to achieve any one or more of the following objects—
 - (a) the promotion or improvement of the economic well-being of their area,
 - (b) the promotion or improvement of the social well-being of their area, and
 - (c) the promotion or improvement of the environmental well-being of their area.




Ecological breakdown





Of 1,694 companies which had positive EBITDA in 2018, if the cost of environmental damage was counted"

-> 15% would see their profit more than wiped out




Taxonomy: What is a sustainable investment?


Figure 7. More than 70% of OECD countries have developed national frameworks, development plans or surveys with a well-being focus







From theory to practice



MAKING IT REAL:

YOU: Reflect on you as a leader and what you want to bring about in the world. Assess what is holding you back and how big your sphere of influence is. Use this to supercharge your capacity for transformational change and those around you.

YOUR COUNCIL: Take you council on a journey to explicitly becoming a 'purposedriven Local Authorities' - using PAS808 (and then the ISO) as the framework (and help build this and galvanize local organisations)

FINANCE: Finance and accounting are core – start working now on ways to account for the positive impact on long-term wellbeing for all and accounting for harm done to this: use of 'True & Fair' director duties, leaning on notes to accounts to record the financial burden created by breach of thresholds


- Local Climate Bonds (LCBs) offer councils a simple, proven, and cost-effective financing mechanism to raise and deploy private finance.

• LCBs are powerful instruments that can help councils achieve their net-zero ambitions by offering an alternative form of financing while fostering deeper citizen engagement with local government.






The climate crisis is a health crisis

- 7 million people die prematurely every year from air pollution
- 250,000 additional deaths a year between 2030 and 2050
- Costs to the health system of \$2-4 billion by 2030




Many infectious diseases are climate-sensitive




- Warming and rainfall change distribution of vectors
- Disruption to habitats increase risk of zoonoses
- Floods and storms lead to wastewater overflow
- Melting ice and thawing permafrost might release of ancient pathogens
- Changes in human behaviours may increase risk of transmission
- Displaced communities can lead to rapid spread
- Changes in food production and supply trigger foodborne disease outbreaks



Over half of human pathogens can be aggravated by climate change




Changing distribution of vectors of disease



- Detection of change in distribution of Lyme disease vector
- Expansion in distribution of 3% each year
- Large increase in distribution in southern counties of England, and part of North-west



Public Health risks from invasive mosquitoes





Aedes albopictus (Asian tiger mosquito)



Established Introduced Absent Aedes albopictus

- Vector of dengue, chikungunya and Zika virus
- Increased range across Europe, dengue cases in Paris (2023)
- The UK's suitability for Aedes albopictus depends on carbon emissions





Invasive mosquito surveillance, preparedness & response

- UKHSA coordinates invasive mosquito surveillance with LAs, APHA, academia, CIEH in England
- Point of entry surveillance (seaports, airports, inland border facilities, distribution warehouses, truck stops)
- Enhanced surveillance in urban centres (e.g. London, southern England towns/cities)






Does your local authority have a plan for controlling Invasive Species of Mosquitoes?

Fumigation in Paris in response to halt the spread of dengue Source: BMJ




Flooding

2°C rise: 61% increase in UK population exposed to flooding by 2050

4°C rise: 118% increase in UK population exposed to flooding by 2080

The health effects will not be distributed equally across the UK

• During the heat-periods between June and August 2022, we observed 3,271 deaths (6.2%) above the five-year average.




- Climate change will exacerbate existing inequalities
- Most vulnerable groups are:
 - Older adults (over 65 years),
 - Children
 - Those with pre-existing medical conditions



- Our ageing population is a driver of climate vulnerability
- Individuals less able to control environments or adapt behaviours are vulnerable:
 - Social care residents
 - Homeless populations
 - Settings (e.g. schools, prisons)

Heatwaves



$\mathbf{2022}$ was the hottest year ever recorded in the UK

Some health impacts are avoidable through mitigation and others, preventable through effective adaptation

- Targeted adaptations save lives and reduce adverse health impacts
 - National heat and cold alerting systems
 - Flood defences
 - Improvements to housing
- 'Co-benefit' options benefit both health and society
 - Active transport
 - Nature-based solutions





